AGM Business Round Up

We completed our 19th Annual General Meeting in the second week of January with a decent turnout of 178 people and 85 farms registering. The main topics and presentations are covered in the Shoreline Journal link on our website.

From a business standpoint, members reviewed the 2018/19 financial statements that showed a clean audit. Members also approved the 2019/20 budget as presented by the board, including a modest \$48,000 deficit. This is a deliberate deficit to reduce the \$985,000 operating surplus. Based on a recommendation from the Board, members approved Bishop & Company as the new auditor for the current fiscal year.

DFNS thanks both our sponsors and out-of-town guests for making the AGM a success. Sponsors included FCC, Royal Bank, CIBC, Scotiabank, TD, Agropur, Saputo and Nova Scotia Cattle Producers. Any producer wishing to receive a copy of the AGM booklet should contact the office.

Traditionally DFNS Board's have set their Executive and made committee appointments immediately following the AGM. This year the Board set the executive and committees at their January 24 meeting. Gerrit Damsteegt retains the chair position and our member on the DFC Board. Byron Lamb is vice chair again as well as our National Director. Hans Vermeulen is the third member of the executive plus he will shadow Byron at the P5 and CMSMC meetings in the coming year. Dustin Swinkels remains on the P5 Quota Committee.

In order to receive the DFNS Excellence Award, a producer must have:

- All individual bacteria count (IBC) results less than 30,000/ml for the dairy year:
- All monthly SCC averages are less than or equal to 150,000/ml;
- A farm inspection score from the NSDA of 94 or higher;
- An appearance score on the farm inspection report of five or higher;
- No freezing point or antibiotic infractions during the dairy year;
- Maintain proAction registration for the entire dairy year.



New RMPT Regulations

As reported earlier, the new Raw Milk Production and Transportation regulations have been established by Natural Products Marketing Council and will come into force on March 15, 2020. We advise members to review the regulations (link at bottom of our home page) with their facilities / practices. If you have questions or concerns, we encourage you to contact Scott MacKenzie, NSDA Dairy Inspector Specialist. DFNS continues to work on behalf of producers with Council and will pass along any written comments producers submit.

Slippery Yards and Lanes

Recently at least four bulk milk graders fell in dairy farm yards due to icy conditions. These incidents can result in injury, exposing the dairy farmer to liability claims. If transporters cannot safely navigate lanes and yards, they may be forced to refuse pick up. To avoid these serious consequences, producers must clear snow away and apply salt, sand or gravel to their laneways and yards. Please act accordingly to help with efficient and safe milk pick-up.

Milk Price Change Feb 1

The P5 provinces have approved a farm gate milk price increase of approximately 1.9% for February 1, 2020. This change comes from the annual review of changes in both costs of producing milk and the Consumer Price Index – an indicator of inflation. Both COP and CPI have increased, triggering the farm gate change. We note that producers may not see exactly this 1.9% change each month as producer payments are tied to monthly milk component production with the dollars being paid out coming from the milk utiliza-

Quota may be leased in denominations of tenths of a kilogram.

A producer can lease in or out up to a maximum of 25% of current TPQ holdings.

A producer cannot be both a lessor and a lessee during the same month.

Only leases applying to the current month will be accepted.

DFNS is not responsible for receipt of lease forms mailed or faxed to our office. IT IS THE PRODUCER'S RESPONSIBILITY TO CONFIRM RECEIPT.







Milk Production and Pricing

December milk production increased compared to November and was approximately 1% less than the December 2018 rate of production. The butterfat test of 4.24 kgs per hl was unchanged from both November and compared to last December.

Additional production day usage reached 57% of the 1 day available in December. Not surprisingly, with fewer days available in December than during the fall months, the producer average utilized tolerance reversed the drop in November (when it declined to -8.7 days of quota) to finish December at -8.3 days. The additional production incentive days, as intended, limit the effect of additional production on producer credit increases.

The NS equalized pool transportation rate remained at \$2.91/hl in December exactly matching November's deduction. This means that DFNS pooled transportation costs matched the P5 Pool average for November after DFNS recovered their costs paid to transporters for hauling milk to other provinces in November.

The average producer raw milk price increased sharply to \$85.34/hl or \$20.09/kg of butterfat at average provincial composition. This was well ahead of the monthly average price which is nearing \$80/hl for the past 12 months.

Compared to November, the total daily value of milk utilized by processors was unchanged however in November, there was significant exported milk priced at approx. \$89/hl and minimal special class activity in classes 5 and 7. Normally DFNS applies for an advance from the P5 to cover the difference between special class proceeds and an estimate of the pool average price for special class activity greater than 15% of production. Since special class activity was less than 15% in November there was no advance.

Not having to repay an advance for November when determining December's price is a benefit but December's special class activity also put DFNS in a position to receive an advance for the month of \$935,000. Both led to the favorable price for December.

The advance will need to be repaid for December's borrowing but under normal circumstances, it would be offset by the effect of a possible advance for January's utilization.
