

Milk Production and Pricing Esben Arnfast, Chief Financial Officer

Nova Scotia raw milk volumes shipped by producers continued more than 5% higher than last August. The raw milk butterfat composition during August was also higher at 4.03 kg/hl compared to last year at 3.97 kg/hl. Underproduction credits increased to -2.6 days of quota.

The NS transportation rate for August increased to \$2.83/hl with new quarterly rates effective Aug 1, 2021.

The Nova Scotia average producer raw milk price for in-quota, below market SNF/BF for August was \$76.73/hl or \$18.51/kg of butterfat using average provincial composition. That compares to July's In-quota price of \$80.06/hl and \$19.85/kg on a butterfat basis.

Although the NS processor utilization value of August was like July's, the pooling adjustment was approximately \$334,000 less. The pooling adjustment was based on July's utilization reported by all provinces and declined overall which also meant a reduction in the advance NS forwarded 5.7 million litres available to NS. of raw milk to other provinces as a result of milk obligations processing movement and limitations. The value of that milk was priced at lower average prices pooled by other provinces for July.

Nova Scotia and Quebec were the last two provinces to implement the new SNF pricing model starting August 1, 2021. It represents the largest change to the price calculation methodology since 1996 when multiple component pricing and pooling began.

The new graph shows the increase or decreased payment per HL for August for all 200 producers resulting from the policy change in August at various SNF/BF ratios. Notes:

- 10 producers with SNF/BF ratio of less than 2.0 experienced a price increase of \$2-\$3/hl.
- 65 more producers below SNF/BF ratio of 2.3 experienced a smaller price increase.
- The remaining 125 producers with an SNF/ BF ratio greater than 2.2 experienced a small price decrease of less than 50 cents per hl.

It is expected that these data points will shift throughout the dairy year due to seasonal milk composition variation.






NS Average In-Quota Below Market SNF/BF Producer Price Per HL basis


